

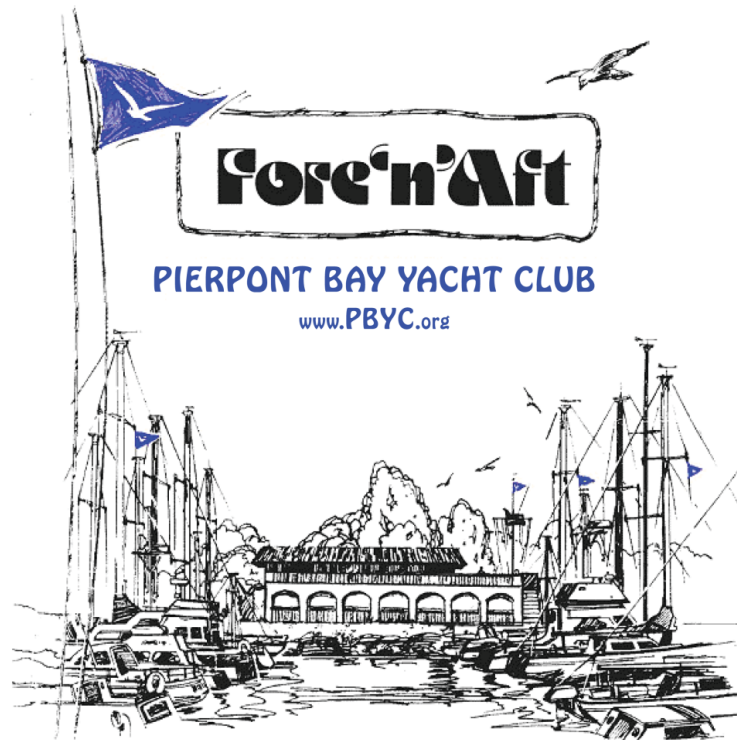

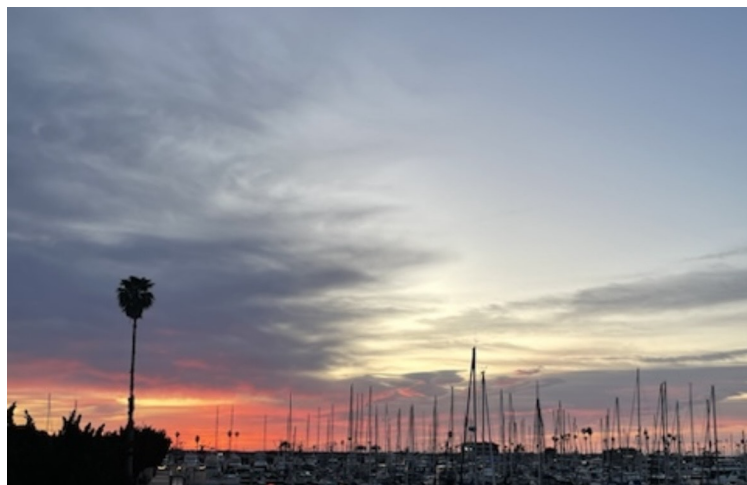

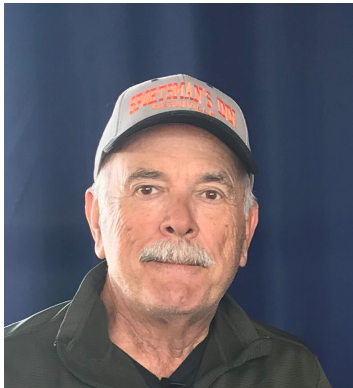

SPRING SERIES

PBYC's 2023 racing season started on February 18th with our three-race Spring Series.

The wind at the start of the race was much higher than the forecast of 4 knots. However, I didn't want to push my luck and selected a 9.7 nm course for all participating boats. The first leg of the race course was a tight reach that went around oil platform Gina. As I mentioned in last month's race column, based on the input from several racers, instead of finishing the race in the Ventura harbor entrance channel and then having the boats based in Channel Islands Harbor spend over an hour returning to their home port, I had boats finish at the Mandalay buoy. Each boat recorded their own finish time and then reported it to the race committee.

Dave Boatner's J-35 RIVAL was the first boat to finish with an elapsed time of 2 hours and 18.3 minutes and corrected out to first place in the Spinnaker fleet. Gary Goodman's Catalina 350 ALCYONE was the first non-spinnaker boat to finish with an elapsed time of 3 hours and 27.8 minutes. Brent Swanson's Islander 29 VELERO finished one minute and 40 seconds behind ALCYONE and corrected out to first place in the non-spinnaker fleet.

Hall Stratton's 42 foot catamaran AKUA KAI was the sole entry in the ORCA fleet and finished with an elapsed time of 2 hours and 54 minutes.

Both the race committee and the competitors enjoyed tracking the progress of each boat on the big screen TV back at the club after the race using an app called RaceQs downloaded on competitor's smart phones. I would like to thank Jeff Heath and Kappy Paulson for assisting Susan and me start the race. The next two races in this series are scheduled for March 11th and March 25th. I need volunteers to prepare food for the racers for the post-race festivities at the club. Please let me know if this is something you are willing to do.

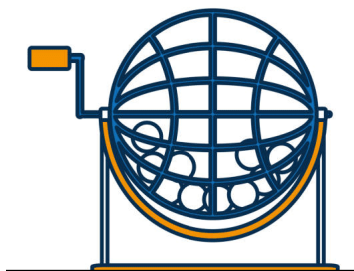

Last winter we reported that local sailor and VYC member Dave Boatner was nominated for the California Maritime Academy's Alumni Association Distinguished Alumni Award. The award was established to honor alumni who have made noteworthy contributions to the industry and/or their profession during their careers. We are happy to report that Dave will be presented with this award on March 25, 2023, at the CMAAA's 18th Annual Scholarship and Awards Gala at the Palace Hotel in San Francisco, CA.

David Boatner graduated from the California Maritime Academy in 1978 as Third Mate and immediately joined the Masters, Mates & Pilots. He sailed "off the board" for several Pacific companies until taking a permanent position with Lykes Lines in 1984. He sailed as Chief Mate with Lykes on break bulk and containerships until 1988 when he began sailing as master. After sailing as master of break bulk, RoRo, and containerships he came ashore in 2001 as the West Coast Agent for MM&P. In 2011 he was appointed MMP Vice President – Pacific and won reelection in 2012. After serving 6 years as VP and 28 years with MM&P David Boatner retired. Marrying in 1981, David and Monica have enjoyed a happy marriage blessed with a son, David, a daughter, Kristen and a granddaughter, Taylor. Even before attending CMA, David was an avid yacht racer and has continued that pastime to this day. Presently he is successfully racing a J-35 named *Rival*. In 2014 he was presented with the Southern California Yacht Racing Unions Yachtsman's Excellence award after achieving 19 Firsts, 1 Second and 1 Third in 21 races. David has just completed his Commodore year at Ventura Yacht Club and is busy overseeing a large dock replacement project at the club. "CMA taught me leadership skills that have significantly helped me throughout my professional career and in my private endeavors."

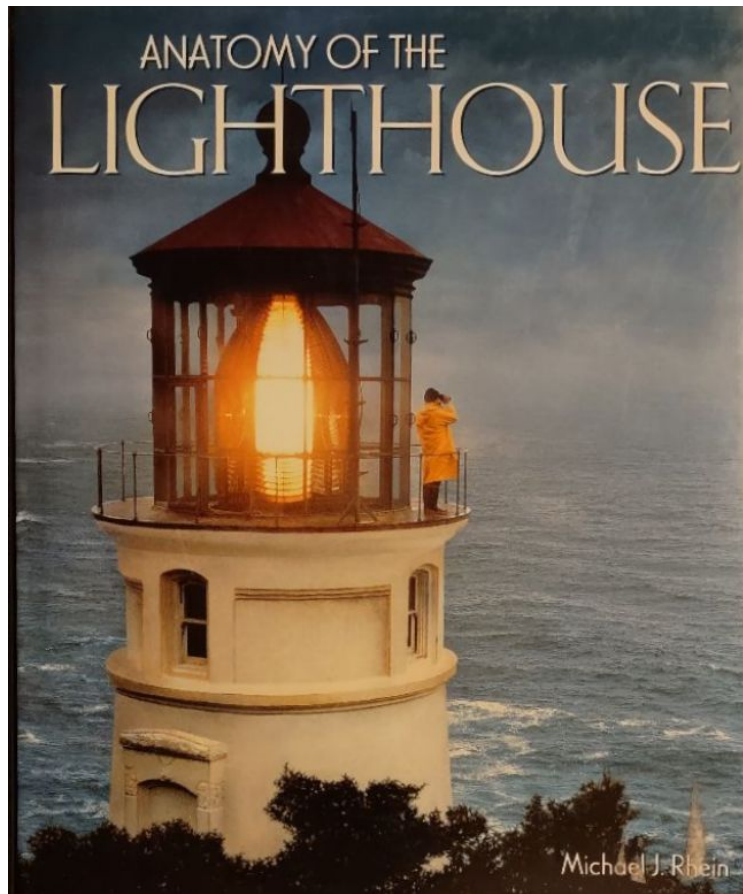


NEW MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

BOOK REVIEW



This month's book review is a coffee table book: *Anatomy of a the Lighthouse*, by Michael J. Rhein. The book is arranged into an Introduction and five chapters that explore all facets of lighthouses. It covers the lighthouses of Western Europe and the United States.

The introduction provides an overview of the history of lighthouses, from the Pharos of Alexandria through the modern era. It discusses the various national bodies formed to administer and maintain lighthouses, the role of lighthouse keepers, and the living heritage now found in them caused by modern technologies superseding their usefulness.

Chapters 1 through 5 explore the effects of weather and the oceans on lighthouses, the construction of traditional onshore lighthouses, the technology of offshore lighthouses, optical apparatus, and seamarks and signals.

Being a coffee table book, it is of course lavishly illustrated with color photographs on nearly every page, including several gatefolds that open to show panoramic photos across three or four pages.

The Editor will loan his copy of the book to interested club members.

CALIFORNIA BOATER'S CARD

DON'T LEAVE SHORE WITHOUT IT

Looking for something to do related to boating while you are spending too much time at home? Get your California Boater Card! All operators of motorized boats will soon be required to carry this card while on state waters. (That includes your sailboat while operating under power.) Good news! You don't have to leave home to get it! Many organizations offer online courses that qualify you for a card. The California Department of Boating and Waterways maintains a list of safe boating courses approved by the National

Association of State Boating Law Administrators and the state. Some of them are even free!!! How easy can it get? It's way better and easier than going to the DMV for your driver's license. Click the link below for more information.

The card is proof of successful completion of an approved safe boating course. The fee for the card is \$10.

As of **January 1, 2023**, all operators of a motorized vessel on California waterways who are **50** years of age and younger are required to carry a lifetime California Boater Card. Each year after that the age limit increases by 5 years. **All boaters will be required to carry the card by 2025.** Shake out a reef and get yours now before the rush. Only two years left!

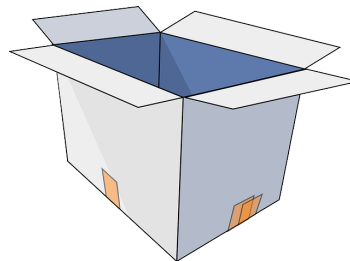
