"Burritonomics 101"

I recently wrote this article for the Santa Paula Times and hope it will be of some use or entertainment to my fellow PBYCers.-Andy

The chile relleno with pork burrito I so love from a local eatery now costs \$12.66 before the drink. The price includes magical ingredients lovingly stuffed inside a warm flour tortilla with its hallmark tinfoil wrapper and grease infused paper bag. Antacid not provided. How has this come to pass right under our snouts if the burrito hasn't changed in 40 years?

The answer isn't what has changed in the burrito but rather what has changed with our unit of value, the dollar. In other words, the burrito isn't better (how can perfect get better?), there are just far more dollars chasing too few delicious burritos.

Why are there more dollars today than there were 5, 10, 40 years ago? (a terrific question!)

The US Federal Reserve Bank began in 1913 to maintain price stability, inflation and full employment by managing our nation's money supply. The FED has met many challenges including but not limited to two world wars, two pandemics, one great depression, one great recession, the Korean, Vietnam, Iraq 1 & 2 and Afghan wars. The results of it's efforts are apparent all around the world with the demise of Nazi Germany, the Imperial Japanese Empire and the Soviet Union as some of its larger assists to our fantastic free enterprise self-governed system. It is not a perfect system but the best we have at our disposal.

But what does the FED have to do with a \$12 burrito you ask? Historically the FED has provided banks access to money by purchasing banks loans (mortgages, car loans, credit lines etc.) to enable them to continue doing what it is there to do-lending money to you, me and our employers. Our fractional reserve banking system allows banks to lend a large fraction of their net deposits meaning every loan purchased by the FED provides a much larger amount of credit to our financial system, us.

Historically the FED has purchased and held approximately \$500-\$800 billion dollars on its balance sheet in turn providing trillions of lendable dollars to borrowers. In recent times like the 2007-2008 financial crisis and the Covid epidemic, the FED aggressively maintained our system (with the approval of Congress) by larger bank asset purchases and keeping interest rates at or near zero. Today the FED holds ten times as much compared to historical averages equaling \$8,342,000,000,000 in loans and other securities. Applying a multiple to this balance (because banks lend out multiples of their deposits) you can see how much money has entered our system since 2007. All things being equal (but they never are) a \$12 burrito seems surprisingly cheap.

A picture is worth a trillion words...

Burrito shops are not the only beneficiaries of all that money. In 1980 the US median home price was \$47,000 and median annual household income was \$21,000. This means that the ratio of median home price to income was 2.24. Today the US median home price is \$392,000 and median annual household income is \$54,132 equating to a 7.24 ratio between home price and income. That equates to a 324% increase of the median home price to annual household income ratio since 1980. This expansion is observed in all aspects of our lives from the price of my favorite burrito, a home, a new car or a share of stock.

Sure my favorite burrito has gotten expensive but it pales in comparison to examples in history. Take the lesson we were all taught in history class about the 1930s hyperinflation that decimated Germany's Weimar Republic where it took a wheelbarrow piled high with currency to purchase just one loaf of bread. Things got so bad in Germany that their central bank could only afford to print on one side of their bills and never mind how many bills it took to buy the wheelbarrow!

The west's free enterprise system has done a great job offsetting the parabolic increase in

the money supply through efficiencies, capital allocation and technological innovation. Unfortunately, labor has historically been the last to benefit for just as soon as a workers hourly earnings rise to help pay for that \$12 burrito the economy contracts and layoffs follow. In the words of The Mandalorian, "this is the way".

A quick look back at a historical reference: America began with help from investors seeking a return from beaver pelts and gold through The Virginia Company which funded the charter of the Mayflower and the Jamestown Colony over four hundred years ago. Unfortunately, its stockholders were not rewarded for their risks as the corporation failed and was dissolved. Our nation is forever grateful for the risks they placed upon their capital.

Like the Virginia Company, the United States of America is also a legal entity with a charter and stake holders endeavoring to conserve a robust system of transparency, liquidity and accountability. Nowhere else on Earth is there a system which can match ours. I trust we will avoid past mistakes of other nations who fell short by overcoming challenges, growing tougher and becoming more resilient. Take a look at today's headlines and you can see direct evidence of our systems ability to quickly adapt to ever changing market conditions.

Let us hope that we continue to benefit from the delayed reliability provided by the foresight of our nation's framers so that our children can also enjoy the simple pleasure of a chile relleno with pork burrito in the year 2063 even if it does cost \$46, without the drink. Antacid not included.



Race Commentary by Richard Countess

SPRING SERIES

The second and third races of PBYC's Spring Series were held on March 11th and March 25th. We had heavy fog before the start of the race on March 11th and we had a little difficulty finding the start line. With a forecast of light winds I selected short courses for all three fleets: a 7.9 nm course for the spinnaker boats and the multihull boats and a 5.4 nm course for the non-spinnaker boats. The first leg for each fleet was a downwind leg to the Chips buoy. The non-spinnaker boats rounded this mark and finished at the Mandalay buoy. The boats in the other two fleets had a course that had the boats go around the Chips buoy and then the Fishsticks buoy. Each boat recorded their own finish time at the Mandalay buoy and then reported it to the race committee. Dave Boatner's J-35 RIVAL was the first boat to finish and corrected out to first place in the Spinnaker fleet. Gary Goodman's Catalina 350 ALCYONE, as the only non-spinnaker boat racing, took a first place finish for the day. Bill Gibbs's 47 foot catamaran WAHOO finished 25.4 minutes ahead of Hall Stratton's 42 foot catamaran AKUA KAI and corrected out by just 8 seconds. I would like to thank Jeff Heath and Kappy Paulson for assisting Susan and me to start the race; Maura O'Connor for providing chili with a side of sough dough bread for the post-race festivities; and Jen and Tim Parkinson for bar tending.

The conditions forecast for the race on March 25th were similar to that for the first race of the series run on February 18th: light winds. So I selected the same moderate distance course for all three fleets: a 9.7 nm course. The wind continued to build in strength after the start with the boats seeing as much as 12 knots of breeze. This resulted in much shorter finish times than recorded in the first race. For example RIVAL's elapsed time was 1 hour and 27 minutes compared to 2 hours and 18.3 minutes in the first race. Larry Listing's J-124 CIRRUS was the first spinnaker boat to finish but corrected out to third place behind RIVAL in first place and Jane Thomas's Tartan 10 WAILANI in second place. Gary Goodman's Catalina 350 ALCYONE was the winner in the non-spinnaker fleet after Brent Swanson's Islander 29 VELERO retired before the start with a lost jib

halyard. Jerzy Poprawski's 43 foot catamaran KASTOR POLLUX was the only multihull boat racing and took a first place for the day. I would like to thank Kappy Paulson, Andy Killion and Tim Parkinson for assisting Susan and me to start the race; and Lisa Hopper for providing hamburger soup with a side order of rolls for the post-race festivities.

The overall winners for the series were RIVAL in the spinnaker fleet with three first place finishes and ALCOYNE in the non-spinnaker fleet with two first place finishes and a second.





BOOK REVIEW



This month's book review is *The Pacific Alone*, by Dave Shively. Commodore Richard Countess read this book recently and passed it on to me.

This is the amazing story of the first (and so far, only) successful trip by kayak from the US West Coast to Hawaii. Ed Gillett was an experienced kayak voyager by 1987. In 1984 he had paddled close to 5,000 miles on a solo voyage north along nearly the entire west coast of South America. It nearly ended badly for him, during an encounter with suspicious locals in Ecuador who couldn't grasp the concept of a stranger who merely wanted to paddle through their waters. He determined to find a voyage that didn't depend on anyone else's help or threats, a voyage where he only had to deal with the ocean.

During the flight home to California, he considered various offshore trips from Central America or Mexico, but finally decided to do "the big one," solo from his home in California to Hawaii. In those distant, pre-internet days, he had to use personal contacts and word-of-mouth to find a suitable kayak and the special equipment he knew would be needed for the trip. Many people laughed in his face when he told them what he was planning, until they realized he was serious. Then they were eager to help in his fantastic effort. Along the way in his preparations, he found a woman who was a competitive paddler, rower, sailor, tennis player, etc., and therefore understood his competitive nature and supported his vision enough to marry him and help plan the trip.

After a few months of preparation, he started out in late June for a planned 45-day paddle. He packed over 150 lbs. of food, enough, he though, for 60 days. When the trip stretched to 64 days, the final stretch was a marathon paddle within sight of land and only crumbs to survive on. His early morning arrival at Kahalui, Maui, was nearly an anti-climax, with no one to greet him, since he had unknowingly been out of radio contact with his wife and support crew since the first week of the trip.

The trip made him a minor celebrity for a while, including an appearance on *The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson*, but soon he stopped talking about it and went back to his usual life, since he really only intended to do the trip for his own satisfaction. He remained silent for 25 years before talking about it, which eventually resulted in this book.

The Editor will loan the book to interested club members, or just put it in the club's library.

CALIFORNIA BOATER'S CARD

DON'T LEAVE SHORE WITHOUT IT

Looking for something to do related to boating while you are spending too much time at home? Get your California Boater Card! All operators of motorized boats will soon be required to carry this card while on state waters. (That includes your sailboat while operating under power.) Good news! You don't have to leave home to get it! Many organizations offer online courses that qualify you for a card. The California Department of Boating and Waterways maintains a list of safe boating courses approved by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators and the state. Some of them are even free!!! How easy can it get? It's way better and easier than going to the DMV for your driver's license. Click the link below for more information.

The card is proof of successful completion of an approved safe boating course. The fee for the card is \$10.

As of January 1, 2023, all operators of a motorized vessel on California waterways who are 50 years of age and younger are required to carry a lifetime California Boater Card. Each year after that the age limit increases by 5 years. All boaters will be required to carry the card by 2025. Shake out a reef and get yours now before the rush. Only two years left!
